
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
Member Spotlight: Melvin Dixon

Our featured member for this issue is an individual who has managed to keep a low profile within KOTESOL although he has been attending KOTESOL events for close to two decades! Well, a relatively low profile until recent years, at least. He is now presenting workshops across the peninsula and serves as vice president of Seoul Chapter. Let us learn more about Melvin Dixon in this interview for *Happenings* and *News* (*HAN*).

HAN: Hello, Melvin. Thank you for making time for this interview. Will you begin by telling us a little about yourself pre-Korea? I must admit that I knew nothing about you before you came to Korea in 2006 – and I only know that from a workshop bio that I read.

Melvin: Hello. I'm from North Carolina in the US. I studied professional and creative writing in university. I worked in





Melvin: I first became interested in teaching abroad during my senior year in university. I went to an interview for jobs in Korea, but didn't make the move then. Years later, I decided to leave the teaching job that I had at the time, and before I applied to other schools in that area, I realized that I had a second window to try teaching abroad – this time, with valuable years of teaching experience behind me. Being from the southern part of the US, I was interested in working in warm countries. Thailand was attractive, but I had college loans to pay off, and doing so with baht would have taken quite a while. So I looked at countries with colder climates than I preferred, but with better exchange rates with the US dollar. In 2006, it felt like people around me knew more about Japan and China than they did about Korea. That made Korea more attractive to me. There was the opportunity to learn a lot about a new country.

HAN: So, in this "more attractive" country, you're teaching at Gyeonggi University of Science and Technology. What do you find to be the challenges as well as the benefits of teaching at the tertiary level – either specific to your institution or more general?

Melvin: In general, in teaching university students English, there is the chance that students feel they've already reached the finish line. When teaching grade school students, they often have the incentive to try to prepare to get into a good university. Early in my time at my school, I found more of that than I do these days, but sometimes I still have students who feel like English won't be meaningful for their future. It is a challenge to help these students find value in my class and English studies overall.

HAN: I believe that part of your teaching involves preparing students for study abroad. How does a syllabus or curriculum for such a program differ from that of a general English studies program?

Melvin: Our Global Education Center prepares students for overseas employment, workplace language study, training. internships. academic transfer. There are several different programs for students though the center. The the K-Move most intensive is sponsored by the Korean government. Students have intensive courses in job skills. English for traveling, working abroad, and conversational skills. Our school operates a Global Workforce Training Program and a Global English class. We also provide mentoring and support for students as they navigate their chosen program. It's always interesting to practice with students for their visa interviews.

HAN: It sounds like a quite interesting and useful program. Let's turn to KOTESOL now. In recent years, you have become more and more active in KOTESOL and now hold the position of vice president of the Seoul Chapter. What do you see as the strong points that KOTESOL has to offer its members – and the ELT community in general?

Melvin: KOTESOL is a valuable resource. It offers opportunities for learning, networking, practical application of skills, and so much more. The variety of avenues for self-improvement, I feel, is the major strong point of the organization.

HAN: I would agree. You have recently led a workshop on building connections for better instruction. In a nutshell, could you tell us how an instructor can go about this?

Melvin: The idea for this workshop came from the feeling that sometimes I think more about the "mechanical" side of pedagogy and instruction than I do about the human side. It is very important to connect to students, colleagues, and other people who we encounter in order to best meet the needs of our students. As we nurture all of the relationships in our life, if we are conscious in these steps, we can apply similar techniques in our classrooms, and we can transform ourselves into the type of educators that do this naturally. One topic mentioned in the presentation is the value of acknowledging the interests of others. One benefit of this is that it motivates people, including our students.

HAN: Interesting! I'll make it a point to be present when you talk on this topic in November at the Gwangju-Jeonnam Chapter meeting. Looking forward, what would you like to see KOTESOL focus on that it may not be doing now or that it could be doing more of?

Melvin: I'm interested in how we can find ways of engaging younger educators. We have a lot to offer them, but we also have a lot that we can learn from them as well.

HAN: How true! KOTESOL used to have a younger membership, but as KOTESOL ages, the mean age of its members is also increasing. What do you like to do when you find time away from your teaching duties?

Melvin: I like to explore Korea. I am quick to hop on a train or bus to visit different cities and towns here. I've been known to play train station / bus station roulette, where I go inside, close my eyes and point to a random location on the ticket board and then go wherever my index finger leads me. I enjoy reading, writing, exercising, and taking pictures. It's also fairly easy to spot me in the Dongmyo flea market in Seoul on a weekend or at one of the smaller flea markets.

HAN: What are your plans for the future? Can KOTESOL count on your service well into the future?

Melvin: Ha. This seems like the opposite of the questions I hear from people at home about when I will return. I've spent many years as a KOTESOL member, lurking in the background. I feel like I have some years of service to pay back.

HAN: And "paying back" you have been doing! Before calling this interview a wrap, is there anything else that you would like to say to our *KOTESOL Happenings and News* audience?

Melvin: I first found out about KOTESOL in 2007, when I worked for the Gangnam School District. They paid for us to attend the International Conference. When I left that job, I was happy to pay to attend the annual conference and was happy to become a member. It has been an important resource in my career for many years now. It hasn't been long that I've been involved in a more meaningful way. "Teachers helping teachers" isn't just a slogan, it's a description of what happens. These days, I actively seek friends and acquaintances to explore what KOTESOL offers. If you're reading this, you likely already know what we have with KOTESOL. I'm happy for this opportunity to share my experiences and appreciation for KOTESOL.

HAN: Thank you for providing us with this interview, Melvin, and for allowing us to get to know you better. I'm sure we will be seeing you at upcoming KOTESOL events.



Practical AI Solutions for EFL Teachers

The workshop "Leveraging AI in EFL Teaching" led by Prof. Duane Henning from Yonsei University was held on September 7th as a hybrid event. Eight participants attended on-site at Yongin University, while 13 joined online via Zoom. Prof. Henning expressed his enthusiasm for ChatGPT, describing it as a skilled co-worker whose outputs he customizes to fit his teaching needs. The interactive workshop featured hands-on group activities, allowing participants to practice writing AI prompts tailored to EFL scenarios. The discussion teaching enriched by attendees sharing their own experiences during group work. Topics covered included using AI for class and course planning. enhancing student engagement, personalizing learning, while addressing concerns about data privacy and over-reliance on Al.

Special thanks go to Prof. Duane Henning for delivering such a practical and insightful

workshop, and offering excellent ideas for teachers to improve their teaching practices while reducing workload. 

The YLT SIG aims to incorporate what we have learned into our activities and will remain in contact with Elite Education Operations to foster mutually beneficial relations with such a valued partner.






